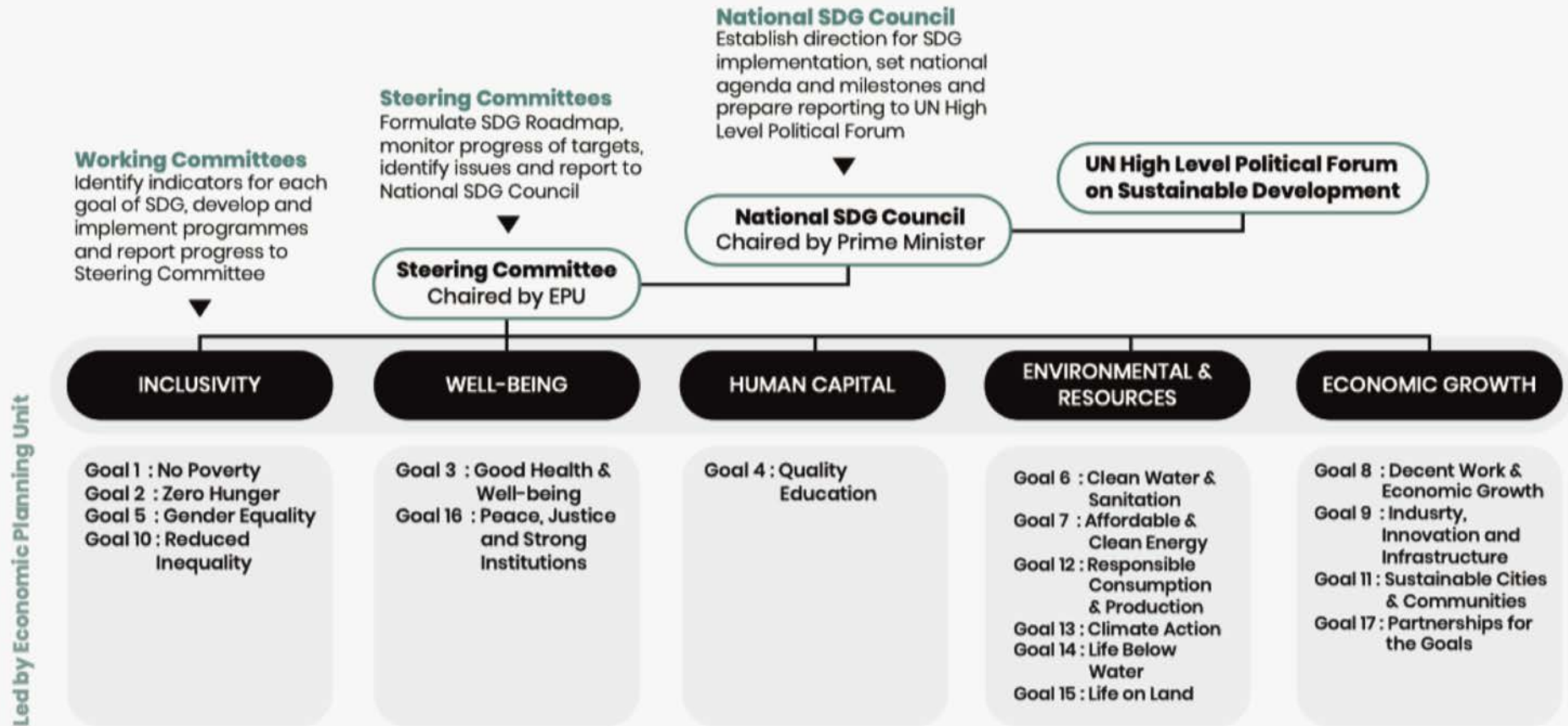

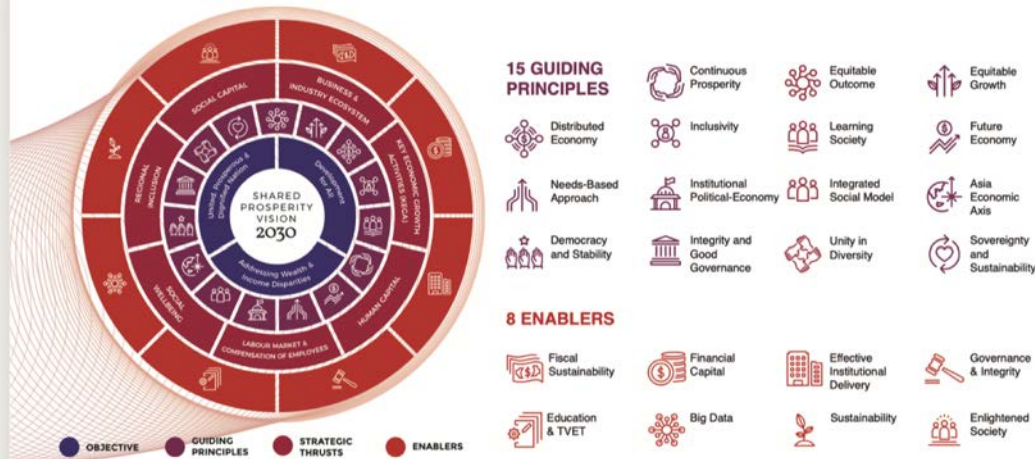

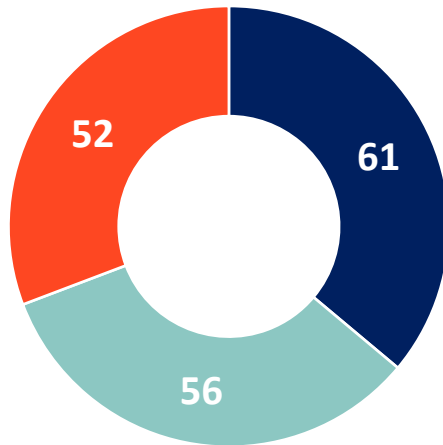

SDG targets are either directly/partially/not related to the role and function of Malaysia's Local Government

The Role & Function of Malaysia Local Government in Implementing the SDG Targets



69% of the SDGs can be implemented at the Local Level

- Directly related
- Partially Related
- Not Related

61 of SDG targets (36%) are directly related to the role and functions of Local Governments in Malaysia to implement the SDGs.

SDG 11 has the highest number of targets directly related with Malaysia local government role and Functions.

Thus, Malaysia Local Governments play the important position in implementing SDG 11 (Make cities and human settlements inclusive, safe, resilient and sustainable).

- 1. City Data Review**
Baselines information of City, Challenges and Issues
Existing Blueprints and Development Plans
Current Roll-out Plans and Its Phase of Implementation
- 2. Mapping and Alignment** to the SDG's and to the NUA and recognizing many activities are compatible with the SDG's and NUA
- 3. Gap Analysis**
Where do we have gaps in the current activity.



CITY VISIONING

- 1. Engagement Key Stakeholders**
Collective review of current city's policies and strategies.
Collective View on Best Policies to accelerate progress and initiatives.
- 2. Setting Priorities**
Collective views on local priorities for immediate actions.
- 2. Key City Indicators**
Setting key indicators for the city.



CITY SDG LOCAL ACTIONS & ROADMAP

- 1. SDG Local Action**
Develop action plans for the localisation of SDGs and NUA
- 2. Setting Goals** for the City. Set the base year and its targeted years for achievements.
- 3. Roadmap and Action Plans**
Develop a timeline for the implementation of the local actions.
Identify partners for implementation.
Identify key outcomes.
City Programs and Projects
- 4. Accreditation**
Local accreditation for SDG localisation



CITY VOLUNTARY LOCAL REVIEW

- 1. Commitments for VLR**
Identify Local Commitments to SDGs that is shared for VLR.
- 2. Mapping local needs to global goals** - An opportunity to emphasize individual programs or initiatives highlight the City's initiatives, plan and targeted achievements.
- 3. Setting up formal/informal mechanism for continued integration of SDGs**
Highlights specific local challenges and how the actions overcomes them.

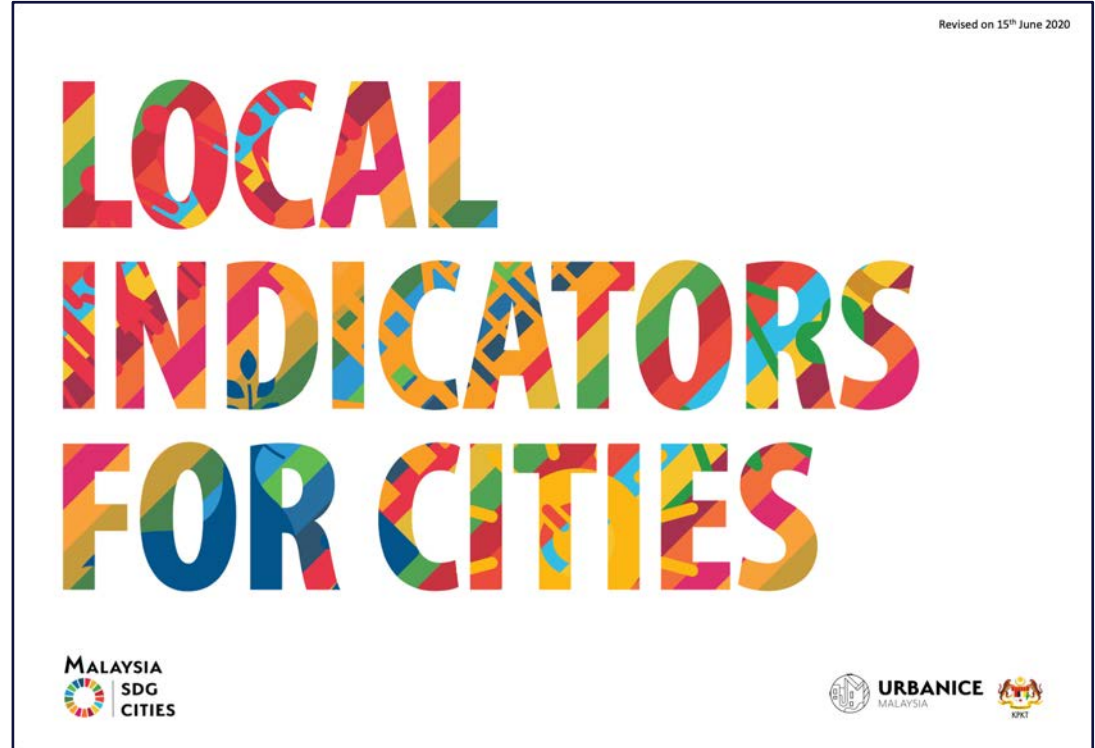
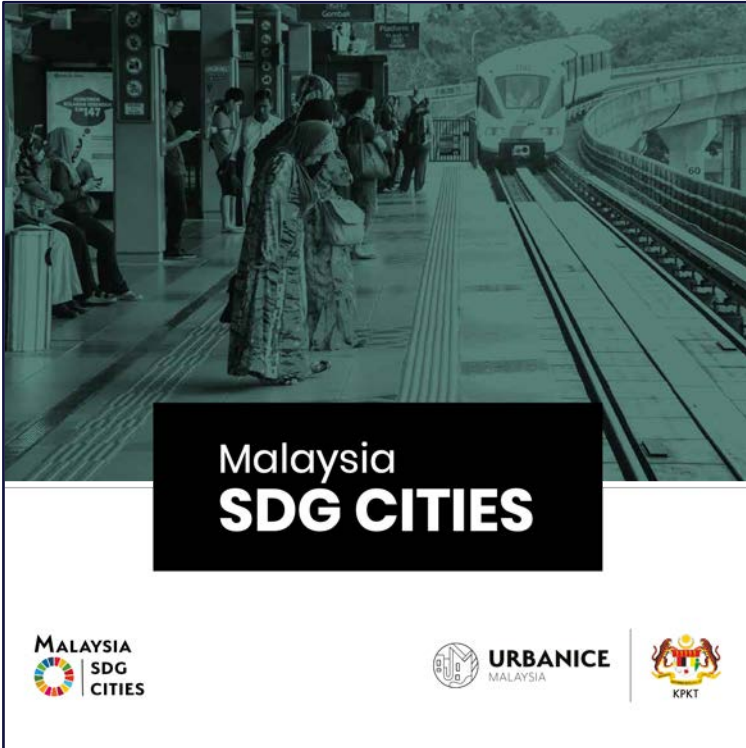

The VLR Local Process

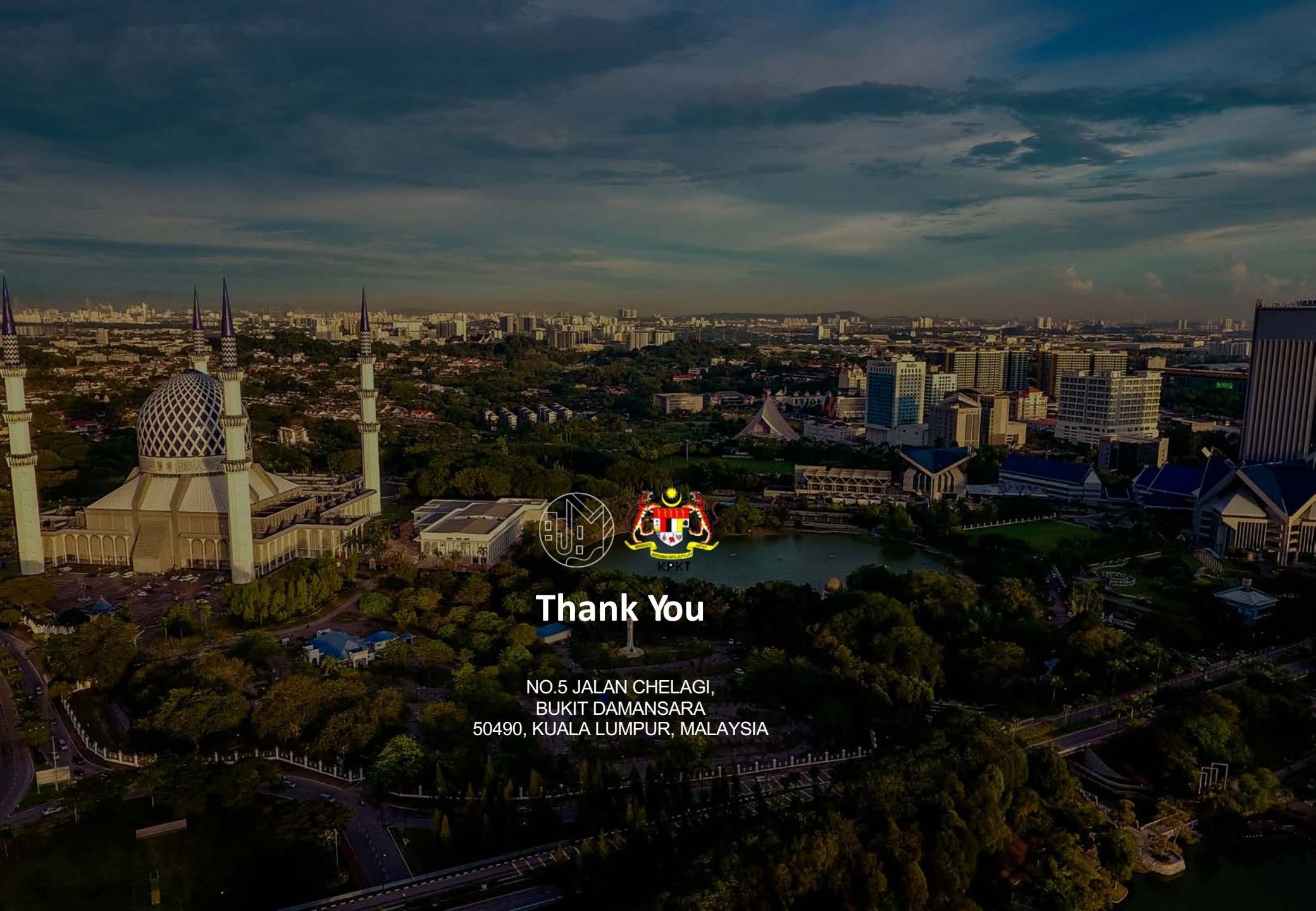
